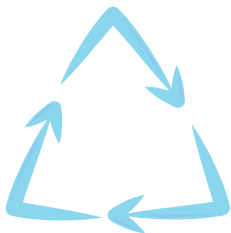
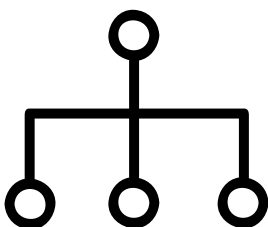


4 TIPS FOR EDUCATORS TO "MAKE THE MOST OF IT"



1 USE THE TOOLS OF DESIGN TO "PLAN BACKWARDS".

Bringing learning online comes with different instructional strategies and tools. Through an empathetic approach and structured reflection, you can determine which tools and strategies will best support your teachers and their learning objectives.

2 DOCUMENT YOUR WORK

How do you work? Where do you work? How are you feeling? How are your students feeling? How are your teachers feeling? How successful was a learning experience or teacher protocol?

3 INSTITUTE STRUCTURE FOR RAPID FEEDBACK

A simple one is "I like...I wish...What if...?" Start asking your teams, classes, or colleagues to regularly jot down a few ideas that might help you have better video meetings, or more productively use shared work-spaces...or when you like to meet during the day.

4 ITERATE, ITERATE, ITERATE

We can't just do things the same way as we did in person, at school, or in the office, and hope that it works. Ask yourself: "What did we learn today about this way of teaching and learning?" and "How will we improve tomorrow?"

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
